Preventive law can be vital to ensuring the current health and future of your family farm. Below is a checklist of considerations to help you determine if preventive law help is needed.

Business Structure of the Family Farm
Maximize protections and minimize liability for yourself and your family by choosing the right business structure.
Maximize tax benefits.
Sustain and survive unpredictable life events (disease, disability, death, etc.)
Succession Planning
Establish proper succession plan for family farm business and assets.
Avoid unnecessary costs of probating assets where probate can be avoided.
Minimize tax ramifications.
Real Estate Acquisitions and Transfers
Understand all the rights you purchase/sell (and those rights you did not) and minimize tax ramifications from any transfer.
Recognize the rights other persons, entities, or the government have in the land purchased/sold.
Inquire into the best way to protect yourself and your family from liabilities that may arise from operations on land purchased/sold.
Maximize value in transferring property.
Property Rights
Identify other persons, entities, government, and utility rights on your property.
Understand your rights and ownership interests of your property and the property you use for your family farm.
Recognize when a government or utility entity may have an interest in taking a portion of your family farm and why they claim a need for those rights.
Appreciate how the government or utility may impact your family farm operations.
Maximize your constitutional right to just compensation for any taking of your family farm's property.
Understand and ensure compliance with any environmental laws over operations.



Employees/Workers

- Properly classify a worker as a W-9 employee or independent contractor.
- Understand and meet all state and federal workplace safety requirements.
- Understand and meet any visa requirements for seasonal workers.
